Abstract This publication is a compilation of nine case studies of forestry re-investing processes in countries and institutions around the Asia-Pacific region. Analysis reveals some clear factors determining the effectiveness (or ineffectiveness) of forestry institutions, and outlines commonalities and differences in the trajectories followed by different countries in responding to calls for change. The analysis further identifies major trends related to forest management including the devolution of powers and responsibilities to a range of actors and recognition of the multiple functions of forests and the conflicts that may arise between these functions. A trend towards separation of regulatory and strategic roles from implementation functions -- and corresponding restructuring of agencies and redirection of funds -- is clearly evidenced.

Abstract Forest Faces: Hopes and Regrets in Philippine Forestry is a book that captures various stories on Philippine Forestry in a photo-sketch format. This publication provides an evocative re-telling of personal experiences and reflections enabling better comprehension of the struggles, dramas and tragedies associated with the changes and loss of Philippine forests. Forest Faces is a poignant reminder of what has been lost, and a paean for what might be regained. The faces featured in this book reflect the naive, the hopeful, the anxious, the fearful, the complacent, and the frustrated. Their stories talk about the prevailing poverty in the uplands, the search for pragmatic adaptations and mitigation mechanisms in the lowlands, well-intentioned policies with no serious implementation, the continuing illegal and "illegal" legal activities - painful realizations of past wrong decisions made. There is almost always a reflection on the past and what needs to be done today.

Cases included the Association of Forest Communities of the Pet?n in Guatemala, the Siuna Farmer-to-Farmer exchange programme in Nicaragua, the Mamirau? Sustainable Development Reserve in the Brazilian state of Amazonas, and the Brazilian rubber tapper movement in Acre.

It highlights the nature of the Congolese forest as a public good, with critical values for the global environment and for millions of forest-dependent people, who are among the poorest in the world. It also looks at the legacy of mismanagement that plagued these forests, and at the tensions induced by the post-conflict recovery.
