## 3rd ASFN Conference

The 3rd ASFN Conference 'Strengthening ASEAN Civil Society Engagement in Social Forestry and Climate Change' was launched with great fanfare on 12 June in Siem Reap, Cambodia. Hosted by the Kingdom of Cambodia, and attended by over 180 participants, the conference concluded with a series of recommendations to cement the budding relationship between civil societies and policymakers in the ASEAN region.

RECOFTC launched two of its latest publications: Training Manual on Putting Free, Prior, and Informed Consent into Practice in REDD+ Initiatives; and Forests and Climate Change after Durban, during the Knowledge Fair and Products Exhibition, held concurrently with the conference.

Both events were designed based on adult learning principles and incorporated RECOFTC's signature approach of experiential learning. Concepts and tools introduced not only built upon participants' existing skills and knowledge, but also challenged them to internalize lessons learned for further growth. Whenever possible, field trips are organized to allow participants to interact with various stakeholders.

## Introduction to Community Forestry in Myanmar

RECOFTC and Forest Research Institute jointly organized 'Community Forestry Training-Workshop: Innovative Ideas and Practices' for highlevel government officers from 14 to 18 in Ywa-Ngan <sub>Dr Nyi Nyi Kyaw, Deputy Director</sub> Township, Shan State.

Thirty-eight participants attended the training which focused on the concepts, strategies and principles of community forestry; and basic elements to facilitate the process to develop community forestry. Ya Gyi and Nyaung Pin Gwa community villages, two sites for the field visit, provided ample instances for a comparison study. Participants walked away with the practical realities of establishing and maintaining community forestry.

## ASFCC Activities in Thailand

The months of May and June saw RECOFTC's Thailand Country Program busy with a 'Dialogue on REDD+ and Climate Change', held 16 May, followed immediately by a 'Workshop on Criteria and Indicators Initiative' on 17 May. Both events were held in Bangkok.

The dialogue introduced the national master plan as a response to climate change as well as address the implementation of REDD+ in the future. The workshop was an initiative to establish criteria and indicators for community forests and sustainable forest management. Both events were well-attended by stakeholders from the government, civil society and academia.
